#### **General Manager's Comment**

Council is in a deficit budget position and has been (and will be) for some time if it wishes to sustainably recover from poor budget management over a long period, and not impact the community adversely as it relates to service delivery.

For the period 1999 to 2016 Council recorded (audit confirmed) accumulated deficits of \$65m which resulted directly in an underspend on infrastructure across the City of \$54m, creating an infrastructure renewal gap of \$40m. This underspend over that period is very evident when one walks around the City, and Councils adopted Long Term Financial Plan has committed to sustainably reduce that gap.

To reopen Imperial Lakes and for it to be recurrently funded by the Council, can only occur by significantly reducing service delivery to other parts of the community.

Council is in a deficit budget position and has been (and will be) for some time if it wishes to sustainably recover from poor budget management over a long period, and not impact the community adversely as it relates to service delivery.

For the period 1999 to 2016 Council recorded (audit confirmed) accumulated deficits of \$65M which resulted directly in an underspend on infrastructure across the City of \$54M, creating an infrastructure renewal gap of \$40M. This underspend over that period is very evident when one walks around the City, and Councils adopted Long Term Financial Plan has committed to sustainably reduce that gap. To create a 'future fund', while maintaining a deficit budget, will only happen by significantly reducing service delivery to the community, the antithesis of what the Long Term Strategic Plan of Council is striving to achieve.

#### Have your say on Council's budget, opening hours

Locals are invited to have their say on Council's budget and a proposed review of operating hours at a series of engagement sessions next week.

Council will be holding three public sessions that will feature a presentation on Council's finances, and discussion around a proposal to reduce operating hours at the Albert Kersten Mining and Mineral Museum (GeoCentre), Broken Hill Regional Art Gallery, and Broken Hill City Library.

Both the budget and the operation of Council facilities is covered under the draft Operation Plan for 2018, which is currently on public display for submissions from the community.

Council's General Manager, James Roncon, encouraged locals to come along to the sessions and have their say on any issues they feel strongly about.

"The sessions will give a solid explanation of our finances, where we're headed, and will explain the reasoning behind our financial decisions," he said.

Mr Roncon said the session would also outline why Council is looking to review the operating hours of some of its facilities.

"The review is not about cutting staff or staff hours, but giving them more time away from the front lines to focus on important work that currently isn't being completed," he said.

"We currently have tourism-driven facilities that are running at full capacity regardless of the tourism season, and a library that is operating well above industry standards.

"It's inefficient and a poor use of staff time and ratepayer dollars, and it would be remiss of us to continue to ignore these issues and not come up with a solution for public consideration."

Engagement sessions will be held at the Library at 6pm on 8 and 15 May, while a day session will be held on 16 May at Council's Administrative Centre in Blende Street at 10am.

Those who cannot make the sessions are encouraged to view the draft Operational Plan online at https://www.brokenhill.nsw.gov.au/draft-strategic-planning-documents-public-exhibition and make a written submission by post or e-mail.

The Plan can also be viewed at the Charles Rasp Memorial Library or the Customer Relations Counter at Council's Administrative Centre.

#### Input sought on review of hours

Council is reviewing the opening hours of several facilities to better align with tourism trends and industry standards as part of its draft Operating Plan (OP) for 2018/2019.

The OP went before Council last night, and will be on public display for feedback for 28 days.

As part of the plan, Council is considering reducing the Broken Hill City Library's weekly opening hours from 52 hours down to 42 hours, including closing the facility on Sunday.

Council's General Manager, James Roncon, said the changes have been proposed after completing a review of the library service and benchmarking it against similar facilities elsewhere in Australia.

"We looked at seven other libraries of a similar size and we were the only one that opens on a Sunday," he said.

"Libraries NSW also recommends a minimum of 42 hours per week for a city of our size, so we're currently well above that threshold and need to bring it down to a more manageable level.

"Having our staff on the front lines for so long also means they don't have enough time to do other work behind the scenes, such as strategic plans and policies for managing resources, sorting and cycling new books onto the shelves, and a variety of other tasks.

"We'd keep the Library open 24/7 if we could, but the reality is that we're operating well above our recommended capacity, and staff are being left with too little time to carry out work away from the front counter."

Mr Roncon said changes to the hours of the Broken Hill Regional Art Gallery and Albert Kersten Mineral Mining Museum (GeoCentre) are also being considered.

"Attendance at the gallery and GeoCentre ebbs and flows with our tourism cycle, and it makes little sense to have these facilities running at full capacity during the hot summer months when our visitation essentially halves.

"For example, in the month of February last year we kept the GeoCentre open for 43 hours a week across seven days, and we were only averaging 11 visitors per day due to the Summer heat.

"We can't continue to ignore that we're badly overservicing during the city's quiet period. It's inefficient and a poor use of resources and ratepayer dollars."

Mr Roncon said the GeoCentre and Gallery, like the Library, also had a significant backlog of work that needs to be completed.

"We have store rooms filled with paintings and mineral specimens that need to be catalogued and maintained, and we need the appropriate plans and strategies to be put in place to do this.

"At the moment much of our management of our collections is ad-hoc, and it's important that we implement structures and systems to ensure our valuable art and mineral assets are being managed appropriately.

"Again, a reduction in opening hours will give staff the opportunity to undertake this important work."

However Mr Roncon stressed that the reduced hours are still tentative at this stage, and encouraged the public to give their feedback on the proposal during the OP's display period.

"Nothing is set in stone. The OP will be open for submissions for 28 days, and we strongly encourage people to give us feedback around the proposed change in hours," he said.

"We'll also be holding a series of community engagement sessions throughout May regarding our finances, and we'd welcome people to come along and tell us their thoughts at these sessions, as the operation of our facilities is very much a part of our budgeting process."

The community engagement sessions around Council's finances will be held on May 8, 15, and 16.

The full list of proposed new weekly opening hours to align with the city's low period (Dec-Feb), peak period (Mar-Nov), and school holidays are as follows:

Proposed hours: 42. Closed Sunday.

#### **Art Gallery**

Old hours: 45

#### New facility hours arrive next week

Council Locals are encouraged to familiarise themselves with new operating hours of several Council facilities before they come into effect next week.

The City Library, Regional Art Gallery, and Albert Kersten Mining and Minerals Museum (GeoCentre) will all adopt new hours from August 13.

The new hours were voted in by Councillors at the June meeting, and will better align the facilities' operating hours with the city's tourism trends, and other similar facilities across the State.

Council's General Manager, James Roncon, said the move to the new hours was a logical one.

"We undertook in-depth analysis of visitation and staffing levels of our tourism facilities, and benchmarked the Library against others in the State, and it was very clear that changes needed to be made," he said.

"We know that tourism in the city effectively halves during our hot summers, yet we'd previously been operating all facilities as if it were peak season all year round.

"It made very little sense, and was just an inefficient use of staff time and resources."

Mr Roncon said the new hours would also allow staff to undertake important planning work that was currently not being completed.

"We need strategic plans on how we're going to manage our vast collections of minerals, artworks and books going forward, and our staff currently don't have the time to undertake that work," he said.

"Even simple maintenance isn't being completed at times because our staff are constantly on the front counter of facilities that are open inordinately long hours.

"If we want to manage these facilities and their inventory properly into the future we have to allow our staff the time to complete work behind the scenes that currently isn't being done.

"We realise we're not going to please everyone with the new hours, but the data shows we're badly over-servicing at these facilities, and it's an issue we cannot continue to ignore."

Council wishes to reiterate that no jobs will be lost as a result of the new hours.

#### New library hours benefit Outreach program

Indigenous kids spent an afternoon learning with Council staff last week as part of the Broken Hill City Library's Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Mathematics (STEAM) Outreach program.

Kids at Community Hub 123 enjoyed a range of learning activities involving robotics, electronics and programming during a one-hour session with two library staff members from 4pm Tuesday.

Council's General Manager, James Roncon, said the program was made possible by the change in library hours.

"One of the strategic aims of the library is to reach audiences who are under-represented in library usage, and give them access to our services," he said.

"Programs like STEAM Outreach help promote life-long learning, and offer opportunities to those who may not have otherwise benefited from what the library has to offer.

"If our Library staff had been working at the front counter until 6pm on Tuesday night, we'd never have had the chance to run a program like this.

"We only have a certain number of staff, and the reduction in opening hours provides them with time away from the front counter to complete vital strategic planning and delivery of programs that were not possible when the library was open for 52 hours a week."

Mr Roncon said Broken Hill wasn't the only Council in NSW struggling to balance its Library's workload against available resources.

"The Renew Our Libraries campaign which was recently supported by Council shows that this problem is State-wide, it's not unique to Broken Hill.

"The State Government contributes just 7.8% toward the costs of running Libraries across NSW which puts increased financial pressure on Councils, and we're not immune to that.

"We'd love to be able to hire more staff, keep the library open longer, run more programs, and provide more resources, but the funding just isn't there."

Council will review the currently reduced Library hours in six months.
